












Thirty years. Not so many centuries ago, thirty years was more than the average human lifespan. Yet that is how long Ice Theatre of New York, the first nonprofit artistic ice dance company in America, has endured and thrived – thanks to the vision of founding artistic director Moira North, who remains tenaciously dedicated to developing skating as a medium for movement expression of the highest artistic caliber.

Three decades of continuous programming is an impressive milestone for any arts organization, even one with more generous funding. In Ice Theatre's early days, due to the scarcity and high cost of ice time, its artists had to rehearse

without pay in the middle of the night. But the company's longevity is now only rivaled by its list of accomplishments. These range from nurturing emerging artists and choreographers, to showcasing world-class talent, to becoming America's first artistic ice group to earn support from the National Endowment for the Arts, the New York State Council on the Arts, and the New York Department of Cultural Affairs.

One of the company's early triumphs was HARD EDGE, produced in 1988 at the old Sky Rink on West 34th Street, with guest appearances by John Curry and lauded by New York Times dance critic Anna Kisselgoff. Legendary

skating innovator Gary Beacom calls that production "a highlight in my career. I still get compliments for the 22-minute solo that opened that show, which ITNY shared on YouTube."

As part of its mission to elevate the medium of artistic motion on ice, Ice Theatre has since collaborated directly with many notable modern and classical dance choreographers, including David Parsons, Edward Villella, Lar Lubovitch, JoAnna Mendl Shaw, Ann Carlson, Jacqulyn Buglisi, and Susan Marshall. The company has also helped gestate a new breed of skater-dancer-choreographer, such as Katherine Healy, David Liu, and Heather Harrington, who also dance











and choreograph for professional dance companies.

Among other notable alumni of the company are Judy Blumberg and Douglas Webster, who were Co-Ensemble Directors for many years. Judy, an Olympic ice dancer, became one of our leading ladies and choreography translators before settling in Sun Valley. Douglas started as a skater/performer, grew into a choreographer, and eventually became Artistic Director for several years before creating his own company.

According to Harrington, "Moira is a gift to the world of skating. She thinks of the impossible and does

it. She created a place where artists could gather and inspire one another to bring the medium beyond the usual competitive and ice show aesthetic. She saw what skating could be and had the vision, determination, and passion to bring it there, educating an audience to see differently.

Added Mendl Shaw, "Moira has done an amazing job of creating a community and viable possibilities for Ice Theatre to be a visible part of the cultural ecology of New York. Ice Theatre has brought ice dance to Chelsea Piers, Rockefeller Center, Wollman Rink in Central Park, and up into Harlem. This has been a very

important contribution to the delight of living in the city."

"Moira has also been tireless about supporting ice dance as an art form, giving skaters of all ages an opportunity to perform outside of competitions, and the older ones an opportunity to be part of her support network and board of directors."

North's grandest visions include creating a world-class performance facility in New York for theatrical ensemble skating, developing a viable paradigm for international touring, and performing at dance and arts festivals. Another dream is to collaborate with artists from the opera and theatre









domains, so that the ice medium can be used to explore bigger themes at major venues like the Next Wave Festival at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. Of course such grand visions depend on significantly expanded support from both private and public sectors, in no small part because rehearsal time on ice rinks can cost 20 (or more) times as much as dance groups need to pay for studio space.

In the nearer term, Ice Theatre continues with its regular New York programming. This includes the City Skate Concert Series at Rockefeller Center and other metropolitan rinks, an outreach program for New York pubic school children (the New Works and Young Artists Series), and the Home Season performances next spring, which will feature a retrospective of select works from the past 30 years (over 70 pieces are in the repertory) along with exciting new choreography. Future collaborations include Improv Everywhere and the MIT Media Lab.

Said Executive Director Jirina Ribbens, "it's amazing how something that started in Moira's loft has survived 30 years and grown into, essentially, a large modern dance company. Moira has been fabulous at finding choreographers like Parsons and Buglisi, who don't know the medium but come to it with fresh, curious minds. Since our work straddles dance and sport, on the economic side our challenge is to find visionary funders who see in us the opportunity to create a new art form: dancing on ice, taking the virtuosic element of the sport of ice skating and expanding it to a soul-felt activity that goes beyond the physical."

TOLLER CRANSTON
THE MAN WHO
"INVENTED"
FIGURE
SKATING

Toller Cranston liked to say that he had invented figure skating.

On an outdoor rink in the little Northern Ontario community of Swastika, the young boy in his sister's white skates responded to his insistent internal rhythms by creating spins, patterns, and arm movements that he had never seen performed on ice. Someone told him that what he was doing had a name: figure skating. Sadly he was wearing the wrong color skates.

Wrong and out of sorts, out of time and out of place, was what the boy Toller often felt. He believed that he harbored a fully mature adult soul, ready to express his inner urgings yet forced to wait until chronological age brought him sufficient freedom and credibility. He complained, perhaps inaccurately, that his mother locked him out of the house on nice days, hoping that her son would run around and play in the fresh air. But all that he wanted to do was to create art on paper or canvas, movement on ice.

This duality would define Toller from his earliest days until his last. Even when he stopped skating – partly because his body and vanity wouldn't allow him to perform at less than the level he demanded of himself, and partly because he had shrunk his good leather boots by jumping into his Mexican swimming pool in nothing but skates for the cover shoot for one of our books – he painted tirelessly all day and

skated in his dreams every night.

The two forms of expression were actually one. I once observed, with no malice, that he had a repertoire of a single routine, set to a variety of music. Caught in something of a ruse, he smiled and pleaded guilty. Toller harbored particular feelings that came out in particular ways through a wide and unusual, yet consistent, vocabulary of movement. His painting, too, had a consistent vocabulary, though the theme and influences changed greatly over time. The key to understanding Toller is that both were the same, flowing from one colorand music-infused creative reservoir that demanded to be emptied over and over. The skating images gave life, movement and depth to the images on canvas. Toller, in so many ways, became his own art.

Montague Toller Cranston was born in Hamilton, Ontario, on April 20, 1949, to parents who endowed him with exceptional intelligence as well as artistry (from mother Stuart) and athleticism (from father Monte). He grew up with three siblings in a comfortable middle-class home, first in Galt and Swastika, Ontario, then in Québec province, where he lived in Baie-d'Urfé, attended the English-language Macdonald High School in Sainte-Anne-de-Bellevue, and competed as a credible pole-vaulter.

After high school, which he completed at age 16, Toller went on to the École

des beaux-arts de Montréal, all the while training seriously yet without adequate instruction. In spite of his dogged runs up and down the stairs of the École des beaux-arts, he lacked real conditioning and refined technique. The Canadian Figure Skating Association offered him a much larger measure of criticism and dismissal than of encouragement in those days.

During his first year in art school, at an age when many competitors are starting to hit their stride, Toller finished fourth at the 1966 Canadian Figure Skating Championships behind Donald Knight, Charles Snelling, and Jay Humphry. He was not mentioned in Skating magazine's report. Significantly, the Ladies field was dominated by Petra Burka, daughter of Ellen Burka, Holocaust survivor, Dutch champion and gifted coach. The next year, Toller dropped to fifth with the introduc-

tion of David McGillivray into the mix. Meanwhile, Petra had collected her laurels and gone on to professional performing.

Everything came crashing down around Toller at the 1968 Canadians in Vancouver where he failed to qualify for the Grenoble Olympics. Brian Pound reported the event in Skating: "Then there was Toller Cranston, Lachine FSC. Fifth in figures, he free skated last.... Those of the jampacked audience of 4,000 who waited until the end were treated to an excellent performance of double axels, difficult combinations, double loops, double flips, superb footwork - a program jammed with content. He finished fourth with an explosion of boos following a display of marks ranging from 5.4 to 5.9."

That was when Toller famously begged Ellen Burka to take him on at her Toronto home base, both as a student and as a basement tenant. He told a sad tale of eviction from his prior lodgings due to the smells of paint and turpentine that inevitably surrounded him. The painting was not a deal-breaker for Ellen, a fellow artist, though she was very hesitant about the teaching commitment. It is a tribute to the power of Fate and of Toller's persuasive powers that Ellen taught him throughout the rest of his amateur career. She demanded commitment, conditioning, and studious attention to technique while allowing his creativity full reign.

In the end, Toller won six Canadian senior men's titles, two world free-skating medals, an Olympic free-skating medal, and world and Olympic bronze, all the while fighting two raging demons. One was a bad reputation for the tedious figures that counted for a lot in his day and were subject to political sway. The other was a certain prejudice on the part of the skating establishment against his chosen costuming, theatrical mode of expression, and "unmanly" movements and positions: out-thrust arms; angled free leg; expressive torso; fanciful spins; almost impossible camel extensions; riffs and volleys of Russian splits. At a time when the standard was staid, stiff, and penguinlike, Toller felt free – no, compelled – to express himself according to his inner lights, always one with the music. His pathos-infused interpretation of Leoncavallo's Pagliacci stands alone in its class. Toller's style and persona served as inspiration for generations of little boys (and girls as well). Audience members of all ages responded viscerally. Europeans adored him, especially the Germans.

Toller flourished most, and with great longevity, in the professional world, going crazy in the costuming department and in everyday dress as well. He was named Officer of the Order of Canada and World Professional Skater of the Year. He created his own Broadway venture, The Ice Show, that displayed the sort of dance-based movement on ice that animates the Ice Theatre of New York. He created acclaimed television specials like Strawberry Ice and Dreamweaver, winning ACTRA and ANIK awards and the Grand Prix de Montreux. He taught; choreographed; designed exceptional costumes; delivered wry, caustic, spot-on commentary; wrote and/or illustrated books: acted in movies and television shows; and exhibited his art throughout the world.

I don't think that it was easy being Toller. Nothing was ever enough. He always wanted more — much of that an understandable but exaggerated and strangely persistent reaction to falling short of the Olympic pinnacle. He granted the gold to John Curry, if reluctantly, and felt some kinship with his troubled competitor. Curry was the classical to Cranston's baroque — equally valid, one might conclude. But he never could get over being placed third.

Esther Pierce, a remarkable woman, watched Toller from her wheelchair and was able to skate. A humanities major in college, she later was moved to write a paper contrasting the classical and romantic ideals using John and Toller as her examples. She found that John, the frustrated classical ballet dancer that he was, embodied control, and a drive toward perfection of form, without the open expression of emotion. In contrast, Toller personified



the baroque aspects of the romantic ideal. Skating was, for him, one of two ways of expressing his emotions. Though he might seem to be on the knife's edge of disaster, he too was in control. In Esther's opinion, he was Lord Byron to John's Voltaire.

Like so many people of genius and great artistic talent, Toller was a mass of contradictions. He could be egotistical — yet he was fascinated by the details of other people's lives and liked to pepper strangers and friends alike with genuinely curious questions about

themselves. He had a special fondness for the woman who dusted and swept his Toronto studio (granted, quite superficially), continuing to employ this "cleaning lady savant" because she appreciated his painting.

Toller could appear arrogant as well, yet he was wracked with self-doubt. He was often friendly, wickedly wry, compulsively surrounded by others, but he seemed ultimately alone and unable to form true and lasting bonds of love. He attracted people and

then purposely pushed them away. He was both caustically critical and lavish in his praise. He was interested in current events and social issues, often holding surprisingly conservative viewpoints; yet he was sometimes subject to destructive lapses like drug abuse.


Toller pushed himself like a workhorse in the studio while remaining charmingly undisciplined in everyday matters. I was always amused when he treated an ATM like a casino slot machine that might or might not dispense cash at any given moment. Cooking, cleaning, laundering clothes and paying the bills were not in his wheelhouse. His time was better spent producing art of one kind or another, conversing in depth, reading art history and biography, or perhaps shopping. It was fortunate that he had devoted daily help plus a few long-term friends for times of true catastrophe.

Toller passed away, too soon, midevening on January 23, 2015, the eve of the Canadian Senior Men's Free Program. Surely the cosmos arranged the event so that he could become the center of attention. His one great regret, no doubt, is that he wasn't buried as he wished, fully costumed and made up, ready to spring onto the ice should he miraculously rise from the dead.

My favorite memento of Toller is a photo in which he leaps in a perfect stag jump, arms arranged dramatically, across and slightly above the façade of Notre-Dame de Paris, a young god making his mark upon one of the great symbols of Western Civilization. Like so much of what Toller did, that miraculous jump on an unseen trampoline was accomplished with complete self-awareness and no little irony. The joke was that his legendary flair for the dramatic was all part of the show. Sometimes drama and even crises overtook

him; at other times he sought them out, manufacturing the drama when necessary. What was the point of an episode if it wouldn't make a good story afterwards?

The things that finally matter, though, are the genius and talent that undergirded all the drama and the inspiration that lives on in others.



Is there any name more definitively attached to the world of figure skating than that of Dick Button? Devoted skating fans and those unfamiliar with the ins and outs of the intricate sport are generally equally familiar with the legendary Mr. Button- and for good reason. Not only did he dominate the sport for years but he also revolutionized men's skating, breaking new ground before retiring from the competitive ice.

Dick Button is easily considered to be one of the most premier skaters in figure skating history. While his Olympic Gold

medals in both 1948 and 1952, five consecutive world championships and seven U.S. National titles were no doubt personal highlights in Button's storied career, it was his on-ice innovation that truly left a permanent mark on figure skating. It's Button who introduced skating fans to the double-axel, triple jumps and even the now infamous "flying camel", a move that was once known as the "Button Camel" named after the man himself.

Button may have hung up his skates years ago but his contribution to the sport has never waivered. 1960 he provided color commentary for CBS' Olympic broadcast and what followed is a career in broadcasting that has spanned more than five decades. He was the first to win an Emmy Award for "Outstanding Sports Personality — Analyst" in 1981 and continues to enjoy what has proven to be a long and illustrious broadcasting career. In December, 2015, he will be inducted into the Sports Broadcasting Hall of Fame, the first honoree in the "Sports Analyst" category.

Button's no holds barred commentary style is well known in the skating community and it is likely one of the many reasons why his opinion is so valued amongst industry insiders. He took that same matter-of-fact approach in his newest book, the highly acclaimed *Push Dick's Button*, which features a "conversational" analysis of figure skating today.

Dick Button is a member of the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame, and Olympic Hall of Fame. He is also a frequent lecturer

and authoritative enthusiast of American decorative arts, with his garden prominently featured in the 2015 book, *Outstanding American Gardens*. As if all of that wasn't enough, Dick is a graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Law School, and he is the proud father of two children, Edward and Emily.





A lifelong figure skating enthusiast, and former Middle-Atlantic States Novice champion, Edward Z. Epstein is author of twenty books, published throughout the world, most recently AUDREY & BILL: A Romantic Biography of Audrey Hepburn and William Holden (Running Press.) A native New Yorker, and graduate of New York University, his other book subjects have included Michelle Kwan (Born to Skate), Paul Newman and Joanne Woodward, Mia Farrow, and Lucille Ball.

As a youth, Epstein attended the Juilliard School of Music; a gifted pianist, he possesses "perfect pitch," and is a member of ASCAP. "For me, writing a book, an article, a play, has strong elements of music to it," he notes. "There's a certain lilt and rhythm that emerges, after many rewrites, when you finally get it right!"

For years, he was the New York press contact for MCA/Universal in New York, working with the top stars, producers and directors in the business. One star he worked with became the inspiration for a play: "Ava," about Ava Gardner, was optioned by the renowned producer David Brown. "It's a one-woman play," explains Epstein, a lifelong movie buff, "and a tour-de-force role. Incidentally, one of the few pleasures Ava didn't experience in life was the joy of figure skating. It never occurred to me to ask her — and I had many opportunities — if she wanted

to give skating a try. She just might have said yes!"

Born in Manhattan, Epstein was the eldest of Rose and Leonard's three children. Younger brother, Stephen, is today a lawyer, and sister Vivian began a singing career (with Ed at the piano), eventually debuting at New York's famed nightclub, Basin Street East. Duke Ellington and his orchestra were the headliners. Only in her late teens, hailed by columnist Dorothy Kilgallen as "a new show world Cinderella," Vivian's interests ultimately veered into non-theatrical directions.

Ed's interests, however, "were always show-biz oriented," he says. "The impact of a great performer, live theatre, thrilling music, a memorable movie — these were unforgettable experiences. None, I might add, greater than skating. That feeling of complete freedom out there on the ice, interpreting the music, expressing yourself in movement. The same creative elements are in play, whether you're a skater, actor, singer, dancer, choreographer, writer, musician, producer, director, entrepreneur. The focus, discipline, and ability required to 'roll with the punches' — 'It ain't easy,' as the legendary actor James Cagney once said. 'When you get a good result, it only looks easy."

Epstein's first book was about Judy Garland. "I assumed it would join a roster of Judy books already out there. You can imagine my surprise — shock! — on

researching the competition, to find that no Judy book had been written up to that point. To the publisher's (and my coauthor, Joe Morella's) delight, we were the first to publish a book about Judy Garland. (P.S. She liked the book.)"

Belita, the brilliant skater Epstein had seen only in the movies — the film was "Suspense," and he first saw it on television — was responsible for bringing him into the Ice Theatre orbit. Ed skated at the same Sky Rink sessions as Moira North, who at the time was creating ITNY. "Why don't you write an article on Belita, dear, for our Journal?" suggested Moira. The article resonated internationally, as dozens of Belita's former co-workers, after many years, sought to contact her. Belita became ITNY's first honoree, flying in from London for the event.

Epstein has written all of the ITNY honoree profiles to date, "a truly distinguished, dazzling group," notes Ed, from the legendary Dick Button to the late, great Aja Zanova Steindler, from Richard Dwyer to Sonya and Peter Dunfield, JoJo Starbuck and Ken Shelley, Paul Wylie, Dorothy Hamill and last year's honoree, Tenley Albright.

"With ITNY, Moira has proven to be an authentic visionary — she has created and sustained a unique organization, an incredible accomplishment," observes Ed. "I'm thrilled to be a part of it, and long may it thrive!"

He is the Vice President of Creative Services at Chelsea Piers, both in New York and Connecticut. However, conquering the complex worlds of graphic design, web design and computers "was not exactly my childhood passion," laughs Scott. It was figure skating that had captured his imagination: "I started skating after I saw Kristi Yamaguchi, on television, win the 1992 World Championship." Interesting how skating became the catalyst for Scott's future off-the-ice career.

Born in Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn, Scott's parents, Ronnie and Richard, are native New Yorkers. Dad is an accountant, Mom a retired bank teller. At James J. Reynolds Junior High School, Scott was on the school math team. "I actually wanted to be an actuary," recalls Scott, "and, let's face it — not too many people nurture that ambition."

Scott, age fifteen, began skating in 1992 at Sky Rink in midtown Manhattan, located on the 16th floor of an office building on West 33rd Street. "In '93, there was a program where I could volunteer to work for the rink in exchange for ice time." he recalls. "So I began in skate rental, and worked birthday parties, serving pizza and birthday cake."

On the ice, Scott learned freestyle with Wade Corbett, and figures with Kenny Moir. "I switched to ice dancing with Darlene Parent, then Nina Newby.

My dance partner was Rebecca Como." Their coach was Bill Aquilino, and the couple won the Eastern Open Intermediate Dance gold medal in '95, placed fourth in Nationals in '96. They trained, for a while, in Canada, "and I almost moved to Seattle," recalls Scott.

Meanwhile, at Sky Rink, while it was still at its midtown Manhattan location, Scott worked at the Skating School with Lori Moran. "When we moved over to Chelsea Piers, Ron Kraut was the General Manager, and I owe a great deal to Ron. Thanks to him, over time I learned all aspects of 'the rink business,' starting with checking tickets! Ron liked to call me the 'Welcoming Face' of Sky Rink!"

Scott became Kraut's assistant and, "eventually, I was involved in the graphic design aspect of the computer world at Chelsea Piers." In due course, he was promoted to Creative Director, in charge of the Design department. "I guess you could say," notes Scott with tongue-incheek, "that I'd kicked the door to my career open with a blade on my foot!"

His intelligence, resourcefulness and sense of humor were invaluable assets, along with his ability to remain calm under pressure. His computer expertise? "I was self-taught," states Scott, "and learned by experimenting on a Mac." He then studied at Parsons School of Design. "Their Design Management program was amazing, and it taught me the economic

and marketing sides of the business as well."

His involvement with Ice Theatre of New York was inevitable. "When I moved to Chelsea Piers Management, the Ice Theatre offices were down the hall — I offered my services as a volunteer." It was 1998, and, to paraphrase Humphrey Bogart's comment to Claude Rains in "Casablanca," it was the beginning of a beautiful friendship that endures to the present day.

"For me, the annual ITNY gala is a giant family reunion," notes Scott. "It's my opportunity, once a year, to see all my friends from the skating world."

"Scott's a genius at solving the neverending technical problems that inevitably arise, and his gorgeous and innovative designs for our programs are always outstanding," notes ITNY founder Moira North, adding: "He makes us look like a million-dollar company! Thanks to Scott, there's always that something extra that makes his work special and distinctive. Bravo, Scott."

Since the opening of Chelsea Piers Connecticut in 2012, Scott has called Stamford home, splitting his time between the two facilities. The light of Scott's life is his son, Samuel, now six. Whether Sam's interests focus on the world of graphic design, computers, skating — or elsewhere — remains to be seen. "It will be his choice," smiles Scott.



The WILL SEARS AWARD is awarded to a young skater who has shown exceptional daring and persistence in pursuit of his/her passion, consistent with the spirit of the late Will Sears.

When asked about her reaction to being the first Will Sears recipient, this is what Carlie had to say...

"Ice Theatre of New York and the Skating Club of New York have been a part of my life since I first started to skate. Because of these organizations, I have met so many incredible and inspirational people.

"When I was three years old, my parents took me to see the Radio City Christmas Spectacular and while the show had many different scenes, I fixated on the ice skaters while they elegantly and skillfully glided across a teeny tiny rink in the middle of the stage. It wasn't until I was seven that I was actually able to go on the ice, but from the moment my blades hit the ice, I have not stopped.

"To be an ice skater is very challenging... it requires long hours of practicing (usually in the very early morning) and never-ending determination and grit. Skating is falling down and getting back up to try again. I started to skate pairs when I was 11 years old. When skating with another person, you also learn trust, courage and loyalty. My actions as a skater would affect my partner, and my partner's decisions would affect me.

"Will Sears was a wonderful athlete, student and person, who died before many people, outside our small skating world, could have the pleasure to know him. Although I did not meet Will, I can relate to the situations, challenges, and joys he must have experienced with his skating.

I have heard about how hard he worked, and know some of the disappointments he must have felt when things did not go his way, as well as the bliss he felt when his programs and training went well.

"There have been many talented and devoted people who have supported me in every possible way. I would like to thank my first coach, Melody Champion, for both instilling in me a love of skating and for introducing me to pairs skating. I also want to thank my main coach, Brandon Hanson, for helping me refine and deepen my skating skills as well as cheering me on and believing in me. Also, I want to thank my other coaches, Jonathon Hunt, Natalia Zaitseva, Judy Blumberg, Samvel Gezalian, Josef Sabovcik and Darlene Parent for their expertise and support, and Johnny Johns and Marina Zoueva, for always making time for me when I'm Michigan.
